IMO, however, I disagree with those who say it sounds EXACTLY like the embedded Paris EQ... the low end reacts a bit differently, methinks. But then, that could be because I'm using it at 88.2k, which Matt himself told me he wasn't sure if it would work with that samplerate or not (it does).

Also, for you guys who are considering getting into mastering,

you absolutely need to check out Ozone as a much less labor-intensive alternative to the method Don brought up herein; you can get your multiband compression, limiting & expansion (4 bands), a high-quality maximizer, exciter, mastering reverb, several types of dithering, a stereo imager/enhancer (be careful! use sparingly!), and a FANTASTIC linear-
