Many companies made Mp3 players. I don't absolutely know what took place, I would assume that Apple licensed what ever technology they needed from Compaq or whoever. In all fairness, I'll mention that Creative Labs filed an infringement suit against Apple for some of the technology in the iPod.

Creative's patent was granted on Aug. 9th 2005 and immediately filed against Apple. If the cloners would have advertised more and gained market share, and if they would have negotiated the royalty rate, Apple might not have moved on.

Apple bought out PowerComputing well after the cloning ended, it wasn't a "join us or be killed" thing. Like I said, PowerComputing started in to building PCs after they stopped building Mac clones.
